
## NHS CONTINUES TO WORK WITH NCS STUDENTS

Carolyn Hardman coordinated the programs for the Nobleboro Central School students in the 3<sup>rd</sup>, 4<sup>th</sup>, 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> grade classes in 2014-5. This year for the first time, the Buddies, older volunteers, joined their 3<sup>rd</sup> grade student buddy at the Historical Center for the program. Britt Hatch and Barbara Briggs have volunteered to help with these programs that give the students a bit of a history lesson and knowledge of old Nobleboro.

By working together with the teachers, they create meaningful and fun programs that also meet the curriculum criteria. The students absolutely love coming to the Historical Center and some classes have dressed in Colonial-style clothing. A great favorite for the kids is using the wringer washer and Carolyn discovered everyone can make butter by shaking cream in a jar – and homemade butter makes a yummy treat on a slice of bread.

The teachers have the students write 'thank-you' notes or sometimes a large note comes from the whole class.
