John Hilton, long-time resident of the area, will present the 280-year story of the water power from Damariscotta Lake falling to Great Salt Bay and the Damariscotta River. Where there are now alewives and homes, there were a series of factories and mills including lumber mills and grist mills, the Centrifugal Leatherboard factory and the Diamond Match, which were the life blood of this area.

"The Moody Family of North Nobleboro since 1700s" Thomas Moody, Nobleboro genealogist, will spin the stories of the many Moody families who settled Nobleboro, farmed, worked and lived here for hundreds of years. Tom tells a great story and this will be fun.

"History of Damariscotta Lake to 1960"

is the title of the book being created by Jefferson, Newcastle, & Nobleboro Historical Societies, and the Damariscotta Lake Watershed Association (DLWA). Arcadia Publishing initiated the project with DLWA last year; a spring 2010 publication is planned. The book is a photographic history of the Lake with about 250 photos and limited text.

What's Happening

1. Almost everything is back in the vault! Did I tell you that the vault has a grass green floor and a sky blue ceiling – and it's great, thanks to Henry Simmons! Sarah Birkett, Flora Gray, Carolyn Hardman and Donna Howarth and I have collectively spent 30-40 hours on the project so far. When the large bookcase, flat file drawers and archival boxes arrive, we will move the artifacts to their proper place – and ensure that they are labeled correctly.

The ultimate plan is to annotate the Acquisitions Book so all of the Society's approximately 1,000 items can be readily located.

2. Henry Simmons will reconstruct the large wood shelf from the vault for basement storage. His help with heavy-duty projects has been invaluable.

3. The new Rinnai heaters will be installed when everything is safely back in the vault. The heating ducts will be removed, which will create a much better basement area for displays.

4. New farm and building displays will be created by Resource Committee (Donna Howarth, Carolyn Hardman, Mary Sheldon) when basement is done.

5. The NHS website upgrade is still on the to-do list and Jean Vose is chairing the committee.

6. Carolyn Hardman has been invited to create a one-room schoolhouse experience for NCS third grade class again this spring.

7. The Nobleboro PTO and Historical Society roadside sign project was halted when the PTO decided to use their funds for more immediate school needs.

8. The Town will replace the deteriorating roof on the Historical Center sometime in 2011, which is greatly appreciated.

9. The significantly revised Nobleboro Cemetery map is getting closer and closer to publication.

Scholarship Applications due May 7th

Since 1985, 57 students received a total of \$45,200 in scholarships. Three \$1,000 scholarships will be awarded spring 2010. Eligible students (of any age) are those who live in Nobleboro or their families are members of the Society – and they will be attending postsecondary school (college or technical) during the 2010-11 school year. The Committee will meet this month to plan their activities.
