Eleanor O'Donnell has served long and extremely well as NHS treasurer, but she would like to retire and is happy to train her successor.

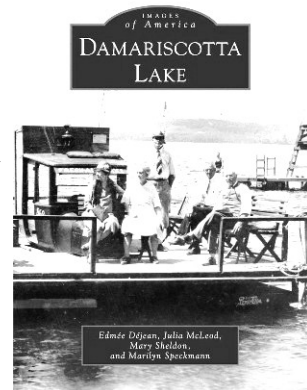

This book is a photographic history of the Damariscotta Lake with about 250 photos and captions from the late 1800s to the 1940s. It was created by Jefferson, Newcastle, and Nobleboro Historical Societies, and the Damariscotta Lake Watershed Association (DLWA).

## ***What's Happening...***

---

### ***The Necessarium***

The Historical Center now has a new Necessarium -- also known as a bathroom!

The Society and the Town shared the cost of drilling a well for the Center, installing a sink, flush toilet



(to replace the gas incinerator toilet), and a closed 1,000 gallon septic tank with an alarm/signal when the tank needs to be pumped out. Dale Wright coordinated the whole project with Marc Stevens, Hatch Well Drillers, and Michael Prentice, Bayside Plumbing. Al Lewis, Lewis Electric, is installing an efficient, in-wall heater in the bathroom as extra protection from freezing.

Henry Simmons totally redecorated the necessarium by prepping and painting the walls and woodwork and putting down floor tiles.

### ***New Furnace***

The Historical Center now has an efficient Olsen oil-burning, hot-air furnace to replace the furnace that sprung a leak several years ago. It was installed by Michael Prentice, Bayside Plumbing, and paid for by the Society.



We had four competitive bids and they all agreed that the old heating ducts are of a high quality and well placed and the 30-year old oil tank seems just fine. Our goal is to have access to the Center and the bathroom facilities most of the year, but we will still use the wonderful wood stove too.

### ***Work with NCS students***

Volunteers Carolyn Hardman, Sally Hough, Adney Peck and Mary Sheldon hosted two visits of Mrs. Henry's 18 very active, interested NCS 1<sup>st</sup> graders at the Center. Students enjoyed learning about tools, home life, writing with chalk on slate tablets, the wringer washer and corn sheller. Carolyn is planning a one-room school house for the NCS 5<sup>th</sup> grade in the spring.

### ***Fish Ladder Restoration Project***

The \$92,500 grant received from the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation for the Fish Ladder Restoration Project will get a lot of work done on the ladder, but first the rest of the \$116,000 match has to be raised to get the grant. To finish the project about \$300,000-400,000 will be needed -- then we will have an exemplar ladder and very happy fish. We are close to the final stretch on this enormous and important project.

## ***Plans for the Future***

---

Now that the Center's infrastructure work is completed, we can significantly reorganize and update the basement. We plan to create displays of the old farm implements, including the two corn shellers and the oxen yokes, and of the construction materials -- and perhaps set up a kitchen display with the wringer washer and a Hoosier cabinet.

Since 1985, 63 students received a total of \$51,200 in scholarships. Three \$1,000 scholarships will again be awarded in spring 2012. Eligible students (of any age) are those who live in Nobleboro or are members of Nobleboro Historical Society -- and they will be attending postsecondary school (college or technical) during the 2012 - 2013 school year.
