This is where Nobleboro historical artifacts are kept, e.g., Town records from 1788 to the present, 100-year-old account books, school and church records, and many other things. It was quite disorderly and hard to find things.

In 2021 NHS hired Patti Whitten, who worked together with Mary Sheldon for many days, to reorganize the vault so things were stored better and easier to find.


