

## About Us

Chartered in 1978, the Nobleboro Historical Society has a membership of about 200. Programs of special interest are presented during the fall and spring.

Each year school children come to the Historical Center to view the exhibits and learn about Nobleboro history.

Two college scholarships of \$1000 each are awarded annually, supported by income from memorial and scholarship funds. A third \$1000 scholarship in memory of Eleanor Purney will be given annually through 2009.

Everyone is welcome at our programs, which are free. All programs, except the Annual Meeting, are held at the Historical Center located at 198 Center Street.

The fall "AppleFest" is back. This year's event is October 6<sup>th</sup> at the Nobleboro Central School for community fun and to raise money for the Society and the School. An Oral History project with the Nobleboro 8th grade students was completed in Spring 2007. The Society and the Town Cemetery Committee continues to gather and catalogue information for a Nobleboro Cemetery Book - as suggested by Dr. George Dow.

## 2007-2008

### *Nobleboro Historical Society*

The Society has a fine collection of memorabilia and maintains records related to Nobleboro and its people. These are preserved at the Historical Center.

The Center is one of Nobleboro's 12 original one-room schoolhouses. The restored 1818 building, formerly known as the Hawthorne School was moved to its present site in 1978 to house the Historical Society's collections. The former woodshed and "two-holer" bathroom have become the Center's office. In the basement a fire proof, humidity-controlled vault stores early town documents dating from 1788, invaluable resources for ancestor finding. Detailed genealogies, maps of home locations (1857) and land ownerships (1813), locations of 84 burial grounds, vital records ~ all are available by appointment for study.

The schoolroom itself contains varied displays of artifacts reflecting the life and times of Nobleboro families. Prized exhibits include a 1765 German Bible, woodcarvings of oxen, Indian relics; a floral wreath made of human hair, a large U.S. flag of 13 stars, an organ made in Nobleboro, and a ship model. Early items from the farm, sawmill, shipyard, general store, school, church, and railroad are among the many intriguing displays.

The Center is open Saturdays in July and August from 1:30 PM to 4:30 PM and all year long by appointment. Admission is free. Donations are welcome.
